I poured the wine into the chalice, which our church had given me. In the one-sixth gravity of the moon, the wine curved slowly and gracefully up the side of the cup. It was interesting to think that the very first liquid ever poured on the moon, and the first

food eaten there, were the Communion elements."
In a few minutes more, they were to be the first men ever to set foot on the lunar surface.

A good man's life

The best portions of a good man's life are his little nameless, unremembered acts of kindness and William Wordsworth love.

Sir Titus Salt donated £200 towards the building of Tenby Congregational Chapel 1868.

He was born in Morley, near Leeds in 20.9.1803. His father, Daniel, was a drysalter and a farmer. Titus was thought to have been a pupil at Batley Grammar school, and another school at Wakefield. He joined his father's business as a partner of Daniel Salt ad Son in 1833 and within 20 years had expanded it to become the largest employer in Bradford, He married Caroline Whitelaw on

21.3.1830, and had 5 sons and 3 daughters. In 1836 he was thought to be one of the first to use Alpaca wool. In 1846 as a senior Alderman, he became Mayor of Bradford. He was elected to Parliament as a Liberal MP but lost his seat 3 years later. In 1850 he built a larger mill and opened Saltair Mills on his 50th birthday, and started building houses, bathhouses, an institute, hospital, almshouses and churches, which became the village of Saltaire. 1858-59 he built the Congregational Church which is now Saltaire United Reformed Church at his own expense, and donated land to build the Wesleyan Chapel. He was a deeply religious man, and sincerely believed that by creating an environment where people could lead healthy, virtuous, and godly lives, he was doing God's work. He was a county JP, Deputy Lord Lieutenant, Chief Constable and became a MP again in 1859 until he retired due to ill health in 1861. On 30th Oct 1869 he was created Baronet of Saltair and Crow Nest in the county of York. He died at Crow Nest, Lightcliffe, near Halifax 29.12.1876 and was buried at Saltair Congregational Chapel with an estimated 100,000 people lining the route of the funeral.
