Recipe of the month: Citrus all-round spray (To clean and sterilise all surfaces in kitchens and bathrooms.)

Tightly pack citrus peeled from the outside of oranges lemons or lime, into a small glass jar and cover with white vinegar. Put lid on and let sit for 2-4 weeks. Strain the vinegar into a spray bottle and top up with an equal amount of water. Spray directly onto surfaces and wipe with a damp cloth. This spray's shelf life, once you have removed the peel, should be indefinite.

Report from your Synod Rep. Mollie

Three of us travelled up to Llandrindod Wells on Saturday 29th February for the Spring Synod of the United Reform Church, Wales. A good journey up meant we had plenty of time for coffee and chat before worship, led by the Swansea Regional Pastoral Committee began at 11am.

Then Moderator Simon, read the Commemorations, the notices and introductions of visiting representatives of other denominations, etc. and extended an official welcome to John, newly ordained into the Pembrokeshire Pastorate team. He mentioned the special training day on 13th June, "equipping elders". If anyone is interested, please see me. It is to be held at The Metropole Hotel at Llandrindod again. Judy gave us a re-introduction to "safeguarding" in our churches, and in groups we discussed the 6 most important features. Her main point was that people need to feel secure and safe in our places of worship. All people, not only children.

Rev Bronwen Rees then gave us another "story" from her visit to Palestine, witnessing positive developments like water distribution, making organic fertiliser, farmers to try to establish food security. She also visited a cooperative run by women and another project in Galilee producing olive oil and soap, which was run by Palestinian and Israeli women together.

We heard another local church story about

becoming an Eco-church from a Merthyr Church and then went into a discussion led by Simon on "how do we see ourselves developing the place of the United Reformed Church in the life and culture of Wales?" After a lovely sandwich lunch, we addressed "safeguarding" looking at a new booklet called "Good Practice 5" Judy said it was an excellent publication available to buy. Next, another local church story about signing up to the A. Rocha UK Project to become an Eco Church. This was Sketty Uniting Church at Swansea. We had a report from the Mission and Discipleship Board which asked us "how might your church respond to the climate emergency?" and gave information about World Church Links. There is a proposal now to link up with churches in Korea. Our final local eco-church story came from Cwmbran United Reform Church, given by Diane Brain, assisted by Bronwen Rees. She told us about creating eco bricks using empty plastic bottles and filling them with recyclable plastic like cling film and crisp packets. These must all be washed and dried scrupulously. The filled bottles can be used to build just about anything, walls, furniture, etc.

As the snow began to fall outside, Simon seized a moment to thank Diane and to say we need to finish our day to get everyone home early, so he led the final act of worship, which as usual, with Simon was very special.

I've left in Church some info leaflets on Westminster College lecturers coming to Wales in June/July to hold sessions (free to all) on "equipping disciples". Please look on the bookcase at the back of the church.
