# **Shirley Murray**

Remember in the last newsletter, there were the words of hymn 685 "For everyone born a place at the table". Well, the editor had a phone call from her friend John in New Zealand. John knew the author of the hymn, Shirley, and her husband, Rev John Murray.

John Murray was a Presbyterian Minister in Wellington, NZ and he and his wife didn't like the Presbyterian Hymn Book, so Shirley composed some new hymns, one of which was sung on a "Sunday Praise" TV programme from Southward's Car Museum near Raumati. Her texts have appeared in more than 100 collections worldwide and have been translated into several languages. In 2009, Shirley became the first woman to be made a Fellow of the Hymn Society of the United States and Canada.

Shirley and John retired to live at Raumati just up the coast from Wellington. John died in 2017 and Shirley in early 2020.

# Mollie's "School cake"

200g butter (or soft margarine) 300g caster sugar 3 large eggs 300g Self Raising Flour Pinch salt 75ml milk 1 teaspoon vanilla extract Whisk all the ingredients for 4-5 minutes. Cook at 160°C in a prepared (lined) tin for 35-40 minutes. When cold ice with lemon icing. To make a chocolate cake substitute 20g of flour with cacao powder (cocoa – from Grape Tree shop).

# How rich I am

# Bay (Laurus nobilis)

Bay is an evergreen tree with glossy green leaves. A native of the Mediterranean region, it is also known as laurel and sweet bay. This is the only type of laurel which can be used in cooking. Although slow growing, it can grow up to 8 m (26ft) in height and prefers a sheltered sunny position and rich, welldrained soil. Bay trees are ideal to grow in containers which means they can be brought indoors during severe winter weather. Bay leaves are one of the three herbs used in a classic bouquet garni. They can be added to marinades, the poaching water for fish, soups and stews. Use the leaves whole as the oil contained within the leaf is extremely strong and always remember to remove them before serving.



The title of Poet Laureate takes its name from the bay or laurel tree. In ancient Rome eminent poets were awarded laurel wreaths.

- 4. Say hello at a farmer's market
- 5. Visit your local Farm Shop The Little Pantry in Tenby's Market.

# **Ball of Wool**

Close your eyes and imagine a small ball of wool in front of you. Pick it up and notice its colour, its texture and its softness in your fingers. Take a strand and watch as the ball of wool begins to roll slowly away from you, unwinding as it goes. As it unwinds, notice any



tension in your body and your mind, and let this tension unwind with it. Feel the pressure lift from your body and notice your weightlessness. Notice as the ball of wool unwinds entirely to become a long, open strand completely at rest.
