Recipe of the month: Marzipan No Bake Slice

Left over marzipan from your Christmas Cake! Or because everyone who loves marzipan will love this, buy a lb block!

Roll marzipan out in icing sugar to cover the base of a slice tin, and a second one for a top to cover.

Filling: ¾ cup of berry jam, ½ cup of coconut, 34 cup of biscuit crumbs finely crushed, 14 cup of chopped dried fruit and nuts, 1 tablespoon icing sugar, 1 dessertspoon cocoa, optional 1 tablespoon sherry.

Combine the filling ingredients and place on top of the marzipan base, cover with marzipan top. Cover that with melted chocolate icing. When set cut into squares and if you didn't want to do chocolate icing, sprinkle a little icing sugar on top. This slice will keep for a while if the marzipan lovers let it!

January 2023


